Angela Diane “Angie” Weddle Armstrong has dedicated her life to serving others and strengthening the Brunswick community. A lifelong Brunswick resident, Angie’s commitment to volunteerism, leadership, and community service reflects the values instilled in her from a young age. Raised in a close-knit family deeply rooted in Brunswick, she was taught by her mother the importance of giving selflessly and living for others, a lesson that has guided her throughout her life.



Angie’s connection to service began early. At just nine years old, she could be found helping in the kitchen and assisting with activities alongside members of the Brunswick Eagles Auxiliary, long before she was eligible for official membership. What began as a childhood introduction developed into a lifelong commitment. In August 1988, she officially joined the Brunswick Eagles Auxiliary #1136 and has remained an active and dedicated member ever since.

Throughout her years with the Fraternal Order of Eagles, Angie has taken on numerous leadership roles at the local, state, and regional levels. She has served multiple terms as Madam President of the Brunswick Auxiliary, as well as Vice President, Conductor, and Trustee. At the state level, she rose through the ranks to become Maryland State President at the age of 29, later continuing to mentor and support future leaders across the state. Her leadership has extended nationally through roles supporting charitable initiatives focused on cancer research, heart health, and diabetes awareness.

One of Angie’s most significant contributions came during a critical time for the Brunswick Eagles. In 2017, when the organization faced the loss of its non-profit status and liquor license, Angie worked tirelessly with federal and county agencies to navigate the complex process required to restore both. Her efforts were instrumental not only in saving the organization, but in preserving one of the community’s most important engines for charitable giving and local support.

That same commitment is evident in her long-standing leadership of Wednesday night bingo. For over 15 years, Angie has led and sustained this effort, transforming it into far more than a weekly gathering. Along with other events at the Eagles, bingo serves as a vital and consistent source of funding that helps provide resources to charities, families, and individuals in need throughout the Brunswick community. These efforts operate as a backbone of local support, quietly generating the funds that allow the Eagles and its Auxiliary to give back in meaningful and lasting ways.

Angie's service extends far beyond titles. She is a constant presence at dinners, fundraisers, and community events, always willing to step in wherever help is needed. Her volunteer work also includes the American Legion Auxiliary and other local organizations, reflecting her belief that it truly takes a village to support individuals and sustain a strong community. She cares deeply about the people of Brunswick and works every day to ensure that support is there for those who need it.

Professionally, Angie spent more than three decades in federal service before she retired in July of 2023 as a Supervisory Human Resources Specialist for the Department of the Army at Fort Detrick. As a certified mediator, Equal Employment Opportunity Counselor, and Employee Assistance Professional, her career reflects the same dedication to helping others that defines her community work.

At the heart of Angie's story is family. She is the youngest of four children, all of whom share her deep connection to service and community through the Eagles. Her parents played a defining role in shaping her values, and she often credits them—and the broader Brunswick community she was raised in—for teaching her to give selflessly and live for others. Surrounded by family and neighbors who believed in helping one another, Angie developed a true hometown sense of responsibility and care that continues to guide her today.

Angie's life reflects a simple but powerful belief: that strong communities are built when people show up for one another. Through her leadership, her volunteerism, and the countless quiet ways she supports others, she has helped ensure that Brunswick remains a place where that spirit continues to thrive.
